EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 26-21
Agricultural Diesel Fuel Supply

WHEREAS, The Governor shall be responsible for meeting the dangers to the State and people presented by disasters and emergencies. Neb Rev. Stat. § 81-829.40(3);

WHEREAS, when the Governor finds that a disaster or emergency has occurred or the occurrence or threat thereof is imminent, a state of emergency proclamation shall be issued. Neb Rev. Stat. § 81-829.40(3);

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2025, the President of the United States declared a national emergency with respect to energy by Executive Order 14156 pursuant to the National Emergencies Act, 50 U.S.C. 1601 et seq., finding, “[a]n affordable and reliable domestic supply of energy is a fundamental requirement for the national and economic security of any nation”;

WHEREAS, that national emergency has been continued through January 20, 2027, finding that “[t]he circumstances related to this emergency continue to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States”;

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2026, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration issued an Hours of Service Waiver for the Transportation of Gasoline and Diesel Fuel “to address potential increases in transportation and agricultural harvesting demands”;

WHEREAS, the United States Energy Information Administration reports that exports of distillate fuel oil from the United States reached 1,935,000 barrels per day for the week ending August 7, 2026, the highest weekly level recorded since the agency began publishing the series in June 2010, and exceeded 1,700,000 barrels per day in five of the eight weeks ending July 24th through September 11, 2026;

WHEREAS, the United States Energy Information Administration reports that for the week ending September 11, 2026, national distillate fuel oil inventories stood at 107,859,000 barrels, and days of supply fell to 29.9 days, each the lowest the agency has recorded for that week;

WHEREAS, the Energy Information Administration forecasts in its September 2026 Short-Term Energy Outlook that United States distillate fuel oil inventories “will remain below the five-year (2021-2025) low through much of 2027”;

WHEREAS, Nebraska farmers and ranchers were expected to spend nearly \$1 billion dollars on fuel and oil in 2026 based on University of Nebraska-Lincoln Center for Agricultural Profitability projections from earlier in the year before oil and diesel prices rose substantially, and;

WHEREAS, Nebraska farmers may use around 50 million gallons and spend more than \$300 million dollars this fall just for fuel for harvesting and hauling grain to storage or market;

WHEREAS, Nebraska ranchers also face substantially increased costs for raising and hauling livestock between operations and to market;

WHEREAS, agriculture is the largest industry in Nebraska, and corn and soybean harvests are presently underway, and harvesting operations consume diesel fuel at their highest annual rate during these months;

WHEREAS, Nebraska farmers maintain on-farm and on-site storage of dyed diesel fuel for nontaxable off-road use, and allowing that fuel to be used in highway vehicles engaged in agricultural operations will make fuel immediately available to those operations;

WHEREAS, the Governor may suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business or the orders, rules, or regulations of any state agency if strict compliance with the provisions of any statute, order, rule, or regulation would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action in coping with the disaster, emergency. Neb Rev. Stat. § 81-829.40(6)(a);

WHEREAS, Nebraska imposes motor fuels tax on diesel fuels used on highways and public roads under Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 66-489(1), 66-489.02, 66-4,141,66-4,145, and any other applicable state statutes

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-495.01(1) states, “the fuel supply tank of a motor vehicle registered or required to be registered for operation on the highway shall not contain or be used with undyed diesel fuel that has not been taxed or diesel fuel which contains any evidence of the dye or chemical marker added pursuant to the regulations promulgated under 26 U.S.C. 4082 or 42 U.S.C. 7545 indicating untaxed low-sulphur or high-sulphur diesel fuel”; and

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-495.01(4) states, “Any person who violates any provision of this section or who refuses to permit an inspection authorized by this section shall be guilty of a Class IV misdemeanor and shall be subject to an administrative penalty of two hundred fifty dollars for the first such violation.”

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jim Pillen, Governor of the State of Nebraska, under and pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Nebraska, hereby Order and direct as follows:

1. Pursuant to the provisions of Neb. Rev. Stat. §81-829.40, which confers emergency responsibilities and powers upon the Governor, I, Jim Pillen, as Governor of the State of Nebraska do hereby declare that a state of emergency exists within Nebraska as a result of the emergency conditions created by the shortage of distillate fuel supply described above.
2. The designated emergency area is the State of Nebraska.
3. Effective immediately and for 90 days beginning on the date of this Order, the provisions of Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-495.01(1) and Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-495.01(2), and any other applicable state statutes which incorporate federal diesel fuel sulphur content standards, are hereby suspended to the extent that they make unlawful, or subject to penalty, any of the following:
 - a. The holding of or use of a motor vehicle registered or required to be registered for operation on the highway, with undyed diesel fuel that has not been taxed or diesel fuel which contains any evidence of the dye or chemical marker required under 26

U.S.C. 4082 or 42 U.S.C. 7545 indicating untaxed low-sulphur or high-sulphur diesel fuel.

- b. The sale, offer for sale, or holding for sale of such fuel to the owner or operator of a vehicle so registered.
4. No state department or agency shall assess the penalty imposed by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-495.01(4) against any person for conduct within the scope of Section 3 of this Order.
5. The Tax Commissioner, or their designee, shall request dyed diesel fuel penalty relief from the Internal Revenue Service in accordance with Internal Revenue Manual 25.16.1.5, within three (3) business days of the effective date of this Order.
6. Effective immediately and for 90 days beginning on the date of this Order, the provisions of Neb. Rev. Stat. § 66-489(1), 66-489.02, 66-4,141, 66-4,145, and any other applicable state statutes which incorporate tax on diesel fuel used in Nebraska to transport Nebraska sourced agricultural products on Nebraska's highways and public roads will be eligible for a refund. Taxpayers transporting Nebraska agricultural products on Nebraska's highways and public roads may file a Nebraska Ag Use Motor Fuels Tax Refund Claim, Form 84AG with the Nebraska Department of Revenue to claim a refund of said taxes.
7. All departments, commissions, boards, agencies, and officers of the State, or any political subdivision thereof, are authorized and directed to cooperate in actions the State may take in response to this event.
8. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect for 90 days, unless amended, modified, terminated, or rescinded earlier by the Governor, or terminated by operation of law.
9. For purposes of this Order agricultural product shall mean transportation of livestock, grain or other seasonally harvested products from the field where such grain or products are harvested to storage, market, or stockpile, or from stockpile or farm storage to market, and subsequent return trips from any delivery qualified for relief under this order.

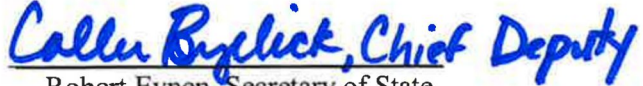
